The Wedding Cake Church

College Church was built in 1898, and as many people will recognize it was placed on a vacant site which was the boggy headwaters of Ievers Creek which started from a spring close by. The red brick, and white Oamaru stone church was called by the locals, "The Wedding Cake Church" at this time, as the white sandstone was crystalline and dazzling when first cut. The soft stone soon discoloured and, particularly on the eastern side, is now badly stained and weathered. The tower was topped by a crown steeple, similar to that in King's College Aberdeen, one of the dozen or so crown steeples in the world. This crown began to decay some years ago and was dismantled on the order of the MCC, who deemed it to be un-safe. It awaits restoration.

At the end of this month College Church will be a valuable contributor to the history of the Congregation of Mark the Evangelist, at Union Memorial Uniting Church, Curzon Street, for on October 29th to 31st they will be celebrating their 150th birthday with an historic display in the Elm Street Hall. Entrance is free.

The exhibition will be open all Saturday, from 10am to 5pm and Sunday from 11.30am – 1.00pm, 2.00pm – 3.00pm, and after a concert given by Fonte Musicale and Trinity College Choir. This latter is to be in the church at 3.00pm. Entrance by donation to Hotham Mission Asylum Seeker Project.

PTAG – Traffic News, by *Stuart Riley* Parkville Traffic Action Group (PTAG, a sub committee of the Parkville Association) and the Melbourne City Council (MCC) are working on several proposals to reduce and manage Parkville's traffic. Traffic issues will be on the agenda of a Parkville Association general meeting on 7th December 2004. One such issue is the proposal to calm traffic in the corporation laneways adjacent to levers Reserve – for input or news on these options contact Brenda Frok on 9347 3490 or visit the website.

PTAG – Electronic Crime/Traffic Watch Scheme, by *Stuart Riley*

PTAG is currently designing a new crime prevention initiative in consultation with Victoria Police. The scheme, which is optional and free, aims to provide two-way communication on traffic and crime offences between residents and Police. Participating residents will be encouraged to report offences to Police through a dedicated channel, examples include: -

- 1. trucks on Parkville streets outside curfew times
- 2. people door knocking and asking for people who do not live at that address (the Modus Operandi of a spate of Parkville break ins in the past – if no answer, the thieves break in at the rear of the property). Residents could report actual break ins or descriptions of suspicious people at the front door
- 3. vehicles speeding up Ievers Reserve laneways.

The Police would keep e-mail addresses of participating residents and send news updates weekly including recent crimes, methods used and tips of the week. This scheme is still in development and has been endorsed in principle by the Parkville Association committee. PTAG expects a November launch – more details are available at

Parkville People

Dr Margaret Henderson

The buildozers were tearing up ground for playing fields when Margaret arrived in Parkville in 1957. "The miasma of Camp Pell still hung over the Park", she says.

Margaret took up residence in a large terrace house in north Parkville. She enjoyed her spacious garden with its giant lemon-scented gum and its peppercorn trees and stayed on there until her retirement in 1988. She then moved into a smaller, modern residence, still in north Parkville with its unparalleled outlook over the park and the nearby grand boulevard of Royal Parade and its glorious elms.

The character of this part of Parkville has changed, she observes, with many more transients, and an increased numbers of students. Margaret enjoys the variety that makes up the residential community, with its spread of age and interests including many young people.

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Initially, she was attracted by the area's proximity to the city, to Collins Street in particular with its consulting rooms, and the easy access to the Royal Melbourne Hospital, where she was an honorary physician for many years. Margaret has enjoyed the proximity to Melba Hall and its excellent musical programmes, the city, and the intellectual stimulus provided by the University and nearby research institutes. The time and energy she once devoted to professional interests has been diverted to the compilation of family historical records.

"The Carlton Residents' Association and the Parkville Association have done good work overall in the preservation of amenities", Margaret says. She considers it important to preserve the Victorian heritage elements, especially in South Parkville.

Practical needs must be taken care of as well; and Margaret cites the Royal Melbourne Hospital's underground car parking as an example of such. She sees flexibility to be important especially in addressing issues of change. There will always be a need for transient accommodation; but she considers this does not justify high-rise developments such as the University Square proposal. "Compromise is essential for a diverse, balanced community", she says.

Margaret observes that it is difficult in a community organization such as ours to offer challenge or attraction, as many members have a range of commitments to alternative organizations and in a neighbourhood where there are many transients including young adults there is limited orientation towards community. Nevertheless, she continues to take an interest in community life in Parkville, and particularly enjoys the Parkville Ensemble's concerts.
